



Mother Tongue, Other Tongue: Regional and National Celebration

The National Mother Tongue Other Tongue Celebration Event will take place on Monday 29th June 2015 at Manchester Metropolitan University. There will be exciting cultural activities such as Arabic Dancing and Asian Drumming, some tasty food, and all the winners will be invited to perform their poems. We will also have some very special guests to present the prizes!

Mother Tongue, Other Tongue is a national Laureate Education Project, led by the Poet Laureate, Dame Carol Ann Duffy and launched by British Boxer, Amir Khan. The competition is coordinated by Routes into Languages.

There are two separate parts to the poetry competition. Children from Year 4 to Year 13 can enter one or both parts of the competition. The Mother Tongue part of the competition requires children who do not have English as a first language, or who speak a different language at home, to share a lullaby,

poem or song from their Mother Tongue. They then write a short piece in English to explain the poem's significance to them. The Other Tongue part of the competition encourages children learning another language in school to use that language creatively to write a poem.

Dame Carol Ann Duffy presents Liz Kessler's Read Me Like a Book

Publishing books for teens and young adults that focus on lesbian and gay characters was once risky business but recent years have seen advances in equality and inclusion in the UK with many more representations and celebrations in literature for young readers. Liz Kessler's *Read Me Like a Book* tells the compelling story of 17-year-old Ashleigh Walker, a young woman coming to terms with her identity and sexuality when she experiences feelings for her female English teacher.

Read Me Like a Book was the novel Liz wrote while studying in the Manchester Writing School at Manchester Metropolitan University – and it's been a long time coming out. Dame Carol Ann Duffy – Director of the School – will be welcoming guests and introducing Liz, who'll be reading from what she describes as "the most important book I've written". Liz will also be in conversation with MMU's Andy Moor discussing key issues around youth in relation to lesbian and gay identity – and the freedoms and limitations faced by young adult writers tackling these topics today.

The Manchester Children's Book Festival and Orion Children's Books are delighted to welcome Liz back to the city where it all began for a special evening celebrating her success – and the journey of *Read Me Like a Book* from project put nervously aside to

out-and-proud, highly-acclaimed novel. Join Dame Carol Ann and Liz at the iconic Portico Library to mark the occasion.

Multi-cultural Manchester

Manchester Metropolitan University's main schools' event for the Manchester Children's Book Festival is a celebration of Multi-cultural Manchester, with exhibitions, performances and taster-sessions exploring the music, poetry, language, food, literature and culture of some of the nationalities represented in our city. School groups are invited to book on for three-hour, half-day sessions, either AM or PM, and select from a workshop carousel that features contributions from cultural partners from across the city and some of our favourite writers, artists and performers.

AM: 10am-1pm (includes 2 x 45 minute workshops, or 1 workshop plus 1 performance); aimed at ages 10-16 and featuring performances from the People's History Museum Living History programme about migration.

PM: 12-3pm (includes 2×45 minute workshops, or 1 workshop plus 1 performance); aimed at ages 12-18 with a performance featuring poets Mandy Coe, Imtiaz Dharker and Carol Ann Duffy.

This performance is supported using public funding by the National Lottery through Arts Council England.

Both sessions overlap from 12 - Ipm to allow for exploration of the cultural marketplace, involving performances, an interactive exhibition and food/drink tasters.

He'll be introducing his first novel for young adults, *Liccle Bit*, which tells the story of 14-year-old Lemar, the second shortest boy in his year, who's told he has no chance with girls, has a hassled mother and frustrated sister, and who just wants to do anything to make life better – including using his art skills to get a date – but who finds himself on track to something sinister when gang war breaks out on his estate...

Full of humour and friendship, as well as family issues and tough choices, *Liccle Bit* is an honest and engaging story of urban teen life with a hopeful message that everyone has a talent that can help them achieve their dreams.

Alex works with the Booktrust and the Children's Discovery Centre to promote reading, and regularly delivers workshops in schools across the country, inspiring students with his passion for literature. He was awarded an MBE for his services to literature in 2008.

We're delighted to welcome Alex to the Manchester Children's Book Festival, where he'll be reading from and talking about his work – and meeting the audience to sign books after the event.

Poet and educator Mandy Coe came to the Manchester Writing School in late 2013 on a mission. Troubled by a decline in the number of publishers launching new poetry for children, and the lack of opportunities for writers of children's poems to reach an audience in print, she made a strong case for Children's Poetry having a place on bookshelves everywhere.

Inspired by Mandy's passion, Carol Ann Duffy and the Manchester Children's Book Festival team launched an international search for the best new poetry written for children. Thousands of poems were submitted and the work of 30 poets – based in the UK, Australia, Canada, Ireland, Uganda, and the USA – was selected by Mandy, Imtiaz Dharker and Philip Gross, and collected into a beautifully illustrated anthology: Let in the Stars.




