# WELCOME TO OUR SPRING/SUMMER SEASON HIERE AT MANCHIESTER POETRY LIBRARY.

We are excited to host *Landscapes of Change*, our season centrepiece, which brings together poetry and science to explore the impact of the climate emergency, with a stunning exhibition and events series from the team of scientists, Kathryn Adamson and lestyn Barr and poet, Professor Helen Mort.

Our panel event, *The Great Waking Up!* continues the theme, bringing key climate change writers' groups together for the first time to discuss the literary world's response to the climate emergency – and why writers need to be awake and active in this current crisis.

This season, we're also thrilled to be launching Jos Charles' new poetry collection, *a Year & Other Poems*, described by Kaveh Akbar as 'a masterpiece,' as part of her residency with us – and to host an exceptional poetry reading series with prize-winning poets Jason Allen-Paisant, Liz Berry and Luke Kennard.

The launch of *Out of Sri Lanka*, the first-ever anthology of Sri Lankan and diasporic poetry, promises to bring to light long-neglected national literature for an evening that is set to reshape our understanding of migrational poetics and the poetics of atrocity.

We will celebrate both the cultures and heritage of BSL as part of *Manchester British Sign Language Festival 2024*, featuring a performance by the first BSL Poet Laureate, Kabir Kapoor. We'll also play host to *The Kylie Minogue (Poetry) Olympics* - an open mic of wonder in honour of 'poetic' spoken word renditions of classic song lyrics.

Join us later in the season for the *Poets of Colour Incubator Scratch Performance* of 'poetic responses' to global challenges, and a showcase of artwork from the *It Started with a Seed International Storytelling Festival (IS WAS)*, which in its inaugural year will share five unique new art commissions by current students and alumni, inspired by Manchester Met at 200.

# 21 March – 25 April Lost Wor(l)ds – Intersemiotic Translations by Peter Constantine

# 17 April5 - 7pm (in-person & online)The Great Waking Up!The Writing World Respondsto the Climate Emergency

Amitav Ghosh's The Great Derangement (2015) said that writers were asleep with regards to climate change, that there had been a great apathy from publishers too. Not enough writers were writing about this oncoming catastrophe and any book attempting the subject simply fell into sci-fi or horror as a genre. Today, just a decade later, the opposite is true. There has been a 'great waking up' in the literary world around climate change.

Monique Roffey, writer and Professor at Manchester Metropolitan University's Writing School (co-founder of Writers Rebel and Ambassador for Just Stop Oil) chairs a unique panel of key climate change writers' groups brought together for the first time. We'll talk about why writers need to be awake and active in this current crisis, and what impact literary activism can make.. What can writers now do? How can we unite to face the coming changes in our climate?

Panellists include James Miller of *Writers Rebel*, Chris Redmond of *Tongue Fu* and *Hot Poets*, Leena Norms of the *No Books on a Dead Planet* podcast and Jacqueline Saphra of *Poets for the Planet*.



*Out of Sri Lanka*, the first ever anthology of Sri Lankan and diasporic poetry, features over a hundred poets writing in English, or translated from Tamil and Sinhala. It brings to light a long-neglected national literature and reshapes our understanding of migrational poetics and the poetics of atrocity. Poets long out of print appear beside exciting new talents; works written in the country converse with poetry from the UK, the US, Canada and Australia.

We are delighted to present the three editors, Vidyan Ravinthiran, Seni Seneviratne and Shash Trevett – all poets and contributors to the volume. They will read from their work and discuss the challenges of creating an anthology that represents the divided nation and the politics of remembrance with Minoli Salgado.

# 7 May | 6 – 7pm Jason Allen-Paisant

Jason Allen-Paisant is a Jamaican writer and academic who works as a Senior Lecturer in Critical Theory and Creative Writing at the University of Manchester. He is the author of two poetry collections, *Thinking with Trees* (Carcanet Press, 2021), winner of the 2022 OCM Bocas Prize for poetry, and *Self-Portrait as Othello* (Carcanet Press, 2023), winner of the 2023 T.S. Eliot Prize.



# 16 May | 6–7pm Liz Berry

Liz Berry is an award-winning poet and author of the critically acclaimed collections *Black Country* (Chatto, 2014); *The Republic of Motherhood* (Chatto, 2018); *The Dereliction* (Hercules Editions, 2021), a collaboration with artist Tom Hicks; and most recently *The Home Child* (Chatto, 2023), a novel in verse. Liz has received the Somerset Maugham Award, Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize and Forward Prizes.

Liz will read from a selection of poetry, followed by a Q&A.



# 20 June | 6–7pm Luke Kennard

Luke Kennard is an award-winning British poet, critic, novelist and Professor of Creative Writing at the University of Birmingham. In 2005, he won an Eric Gregory Award for his first collection *The Solex Brothers*. His second collection, *The Harbour Beyond The Movie*, was shortlisted for the 2007 Forward Prize for Best Collection. In 2014, he was named as one of the Poetry Book Society's Next Generation Poets. His debut novel, *The Transition*, was published by Fourth Estate in 2017; his second novel, *The Answer to Everything*, was published in 2021 – and his poetry collection, *Notes on the Sonnets*, won the 2021 Forward Prize for Best Collection.

Luke will be reading from a selection of his poetry, followed by a conversation on poetry and writing with Nikolai Duffy.



#### 5 June - 31 August

Landscapes of Change brings together poetry and science to explore how the impact of the climate emergency is making itself known. The exhibition features films, poetry across multiple languages and special activities for children.

In September 2023, scientists Kathryn Adamson and Iestyn Barr and poet Helen Mort visited Narsaq, South Greenland to undertake scientific research and to work with the local community. In Greenland, climate warming is resulting in the melting of glaciers, thawing of permafrost, sea level rise, coastal erosion, and decreased sea ice thickness; with major human, landscape, wildlife, and economic impacts.

As well as examining these changes scientifically, the project aimed to start a dialogue with members of the community whose lives are changing rapidly.

The exhibition preview will include contributions from the team behind the research, along with a reveal of a limited-edition hand-printed poetry broadside co-created with Manchester Met students and staff for the occasion.

#### 15 June | 11am – 4pm Family Day

Join poet Helen Mort for a special drop-in session for families as part of Manchester Festival of Libraries. Families will have the opportunity to create new poems bringing together poetry and science, by responding to the exhibition.

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In the shop, they sell candles, guns and a picture of the Virgin Mary. The houses are apricot-and-lemon, forest green, every blue suggested by the moods of water.

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It will rain tomorrow and you will gather all you've left undone walk aimlessly along the shore harvesting old griefs.

In the turf house, there was a picture of Marilyn Monroe on the far wall, the ice-twinkle of her left eye.

By the water, a clump of polystyrene from the tip at the edge of town cheerfully mimicking a berg,

all pale spikes and white crowns. Your heart breaks for it, so obnoxious, trying so hard to integrate itself.

# 28 May | 6 – 8pm The Kylie Minogue (Poetry) Olympics

7th July 1996. Everyone remembers where they were when it happened. Kylie Minogue, the Poetry Olympics, *I Should Be So Lucky* – need we say more?

Well then: some 28 years ago, after being introduced by friend, fan, collaborator and countryman Nick Cave, Kylie Minogue took to the Royal Albert Hall stage in front of poetry's brightest lights (including John Cooper Clarke, Simon Armitage and Carol Ann Duffy) to deliver a wonderfully 'poetic' spoken-word rendition of *I Should Be So Lucky* – and it's fair to say the poetry world has never been quite the same since.

This year, to celebrate Kylie's birthday, we'll be hosting The Kylie Minogue (Poetry) Olympics, an open mic in the truest sense of the word. We want you to interpret Kylie's words / music / existence in whatever way you see fit, be it poetry, music, dance, performances... all are welcome at the Kylie Olympics. Just keep the set-up simple, please – we're poets, not engineers, after all.
